meeting format *(steps 1 ~ 5 should be completed within 1 hour)*

1. **Opening Prayer** – Volunteer needed to offer a spontaneous prayer.
2. **Prayers for:** Unity, the intercession of the Holy Spirit, Litany of Humility and others are encouraged. *(From the Stewardship of Leadership Prayer booklet and spontaneous)*
3. **Scripture Reading** – Volunteer needed to read. All members are invited to write down all inspirations they receive from the Scripture reading on the provided worksheet.
4. **1–3 Minutes of Silence** – A short period of quiet reflection is requested after the reading allowing the Holy Spirit to open our hearts and spirits to the reading.
5. **Group Contribution** – All members are invited to contribute what impacted them in this Scripture reading, sharing inspirations, personal stories and how they relate to their lives.
6. **Group Accountability Session (up to 20 minutes)** – The group could break out into groups of 3 to 4 if they choose, or remain as a group. This will be a time for each participant to delve into specific areas of self-growth related to the topic being discussed. Each participant is invited to document, on the provided worksheet, specific Action Items they plan to accomplish over the next week. These Action Items could be reviewed at the following week's break-out session.
7. **Prayer Requests/Praise Items** – All members are welcome to share prayer requests and/or praise items to be offered up in prayer by the group. Please feel free to write these down on the provided worksheet.
8. **Closing Prayers**
 - Volunteer needed to pray for the requests/intentions.
 - Prayers for a peaceful spirit *(from the Stewardship of Leadership Prayer booklet)*
 - Spontaneous Thanksgiving prayer for our time together

Romans 13:9–14

The commandments, “You shall not commit adultery; you shall not kill; you shall not steal; you shall not covet,” and whatever other commandment there may be, are summed up in this saying, [namely] “You shall love your neighbor as yourself.” Love does no evil to the neighbor; hence, love is the fulfillment of the law.

And do this because you know the time; it is the hour now for you to awake from sleep. For our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed; the night is advanced, the day is at hand. Let us then throw off the works of darkness [and] put on the armor of light; let us conduct ourselves properly as in the day, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in promiscuity and licentiousness, not in rivalry and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the flesh.

suggested talking points

1. The Ten Commandments wrap up the fruits of the Gospel in a nutshell. Love God and one another concisely explains our purpose. Greater love has no man but to lay down his life for his friend. How might we demonstrate love in action? Name several illustrations.
2. There is urgency in this passage to wake up, live with purpose, lead with purpose. Name the activities we are to put behind us.
3. We are to clothe ourselves with the Lord Jesus Christ. Of what are those “clothes” (so to speak) to consist? How do we “make no provision for the flesh” and “put away” the lusts and gratifications of the old nature?

suggested talking points

2. Paul calls us “soldiers”. We are to endure suffering as a “1st Class Soldier”. Soldiers are trained with a purpose. They do not get distracted with “civilian” life but aim only to please their “commanding officer”. What can we take away from this illustration?
3. The athlete and the farmer both labor to win a prize, accomplish a goal. How much more should we “soldiers” lead with purpose?

Job 42:7–17

And after the LORD had spoken these words to Job, the LORD said to Eliphaz the Temanite, “My anger blazes against you and your two friends! You have not spoken rightly concerning me, as has my servant Job. So now take seven bulls and seven rams, and go to my servant Job, and sacrifice a burnt offering for yourselves, and let my servant Job pray for you. To him I will show favor, and not punish your folly, for you have not spoken rightly concerning me, as has my servant Job.” Then Eliphaz the Temanite, and Bildad the Shuhite, and Zophar the Naamathite, went and did as the LORD had commanded them. The LORD showed favor to Job.

The LORD also restored the prosperity of Job, after he had prayed for his friends; the LORD even gave to Job twice as much as he had before. Then all his brothers and sisters came to him, and all his former acquaintances, and they dined with him in his house. They consoled and comforted him for all the evil the LORD had brought upon him, and each one gave him a piece of money and a gold ring.

Thus the LORD blessed the later days of Job more than his earlier ones. Now he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, a thousand yoke of oxen, and a thousand she-donkeys. He also had seven sons and three daughters: the first daughter he called Jemimah, the second Keziah, and the third Keren-happuch. In all the land no other women were as beautiful as the daughters of Job; and their father gave them an inheritance among their brothers.

After this, Job lived a hundred and forty years; and he saw his children, his grandchildren, and even his great-grandchildren. Then Job died, old and full of years.

suggested talking points

1. Job lost everything and everyone close to him. He was told to curse God and die. Yet God honored him because he remained faithful. Despite his wretched losses, how did he survive?
2. It was a lonely, treacherous walk for Job. Why did God later honor him with double? With success? With a blessed family?
3. Job was a wealthy man and yet God used him to be a testimony of obedience, blessing and uncompromising faith for generations to observe in the midst of his trials and betrayals. Had you lived during Job’s time, what would your reaction be... a) as Job? b) as a friend? c) as a family member? d) as his wife?

1 Samuel 18:1–14

By the time David finished speaking with Saul, Jonathan's life became bound up with David's life; he loved him as his very self. Saul retained David on that day and did not allow him to return to his father's house. Jonathan and David made a covenant, because Jonathan loved him as his very self. Jonathan took off the cloak he was wearing and handed it over to David, along with his military dress, even his sword, bow, and belt. David then carried out successfully every mission on which Saul sent him. So Saul put him in charge of his soldiers; this met with the approval of the whole army, even Saul's officers.

At the approach of Saul and David, on David's return after striking down the Philistine, women came out from all the cities of Israel to meet Saul the king, singing and dancing, with tambourines, joyful songs, and stringed instruments. The women played and sang:

"Saul has slain his thousands, David his tens of thousands."

Saul was very angry and resentful of the song, for he thought: "They give David tens of thousands, but only thousands to me. All that remains for him is the kingship." From that day on, Saul kept a jealous eye on David.

The next day an evil spirit from God rushed upon Saul, and he raged in his house. David was in attendance, playing the harp as at other times, while Saul was holding his spear. Saul poised the spear, thinking, "I will nail David to the wall!" But twice David escaped him. Saul then began to fear David because the LORD was with him but had turned away from Saul. Saul sent him out of his presence and appointed him a field officer. So David led the people on their military expeditions and prospered in all his ways, for the LORD was with him.

1. Re-affirm the relationship between Jonathan and David. Who was Jonathan? What was the covenant that Jonathan made with David and why?
2. David was successful wherever Saul sent him and he found favor with the people. Why did all of this infuriate Saul?
3. The jealousy of King Saul was intensified because God was with David and an evil spirit had come into Saul. Throughout this trial, how did David succeed and display wisdom?

1 Samuel 18:15–30

Seeing how he prospered, Saul feared David. But all Israel and Judah loved David, since he led them on their expeditions.

Saul said to David, “Look, I will give you my older daughter, Merob, in marriage if you become my warrior and fight the battles of the LORD.” Saul thought, “I will not lay a hand on him. Let the hand of the Philistines strike him.” But David answered Saul: “Who am I? And who are my kindred or my father’s clan in Israel that I should become the king’s son-in-law?” But when the time came for Saul’s daughter Merob to be given to David, she was given as wife to Adriel the Meholathite instead.

Now Saul’s daughter Michal loved David. When this was reported to Saul, he was pleased. He thought, “I will offer her to him as a trap, so that the hand of the Philistines may strike him.” So for the second time Saul said to David, “You shall become my son-in-law today.” Saul then ordered his servants, “Speak to David privately and say: The king favors you, and all his officers love you. You should become son-in-law to the king.” But when Saul’s servants mentioned this to David, he said: “Is becoming the king’s son-in-law a trivial matter in your eyes? I am poor and insignificant.” When his servants reported David’s answer to him, Saul commanded them, “Say this to David: The king desires no other price for the bride than the foreskins of one hundred Philistines, that he may thus take vengeance on his enemies.” Saul intended to have David fall into the hands of the Philistines. When the servants reported this offer to David, he was pleased with the prospect of becoming the king’s son-in-law. Before the year was up, David arose and went with his men and slew two hundred Philistines. He brought back their foreskins and counted them out before the king that he might become the king’s son-in-law. So Saul gave him his daughter Michal as wife. Then Saul realized that the LORD was with David and that his own daughter Michal loved David. So Saul feared David all the more and was his enemy ever after.

The Philistine chiefs continued to make forays, but each time they took the field, David was more successful against them than any of Saul’s other officers, and his name was held in great esteem.

The Word of the Lord — **Thanks be to God**

suggested talking points

1. Saul saw how capable and successful David was, so he tried to kill him out of jealousy. He withheld obvious blessing and put a price tag on his favor as a snare. Explain this. Has this ever happened to you?
2. Saul tried to connive David’s death because the Lord was with David. David delivered to Saul what he asked and yet remained humble. Did David see the “big picture”?
3. Due to David’s wisdom and success in battle, his name was highly esteemed. How important are right responses, values and actions when it comes to favor and success?

2. We are called “Oaks of Righteousness”, the planting of the Lord. What a calling we have to rebuild the things the enemy destroys. In practical terms, what are some of the “reconstruction projects”?
3. The legacy which Jesus left for us, we leave for our disciples. As you evaluate the answers to questions 1 and 2, where is God using you? What do you have yet to do? Where is your ministry focus?

Acts 1:1–8

In the first book, Theophilus, I dealt with all that Jesus did and taught until the day he was taken up, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. He presented himself alive to them by many proofs after he had suffered, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While meeting with them, he enjoined them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for “the promise of the Father about which you have heard me speak; for John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the holy Spirit.”

When they had gathered together they asked him, “Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?” He answered them, “It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority. But you will receive power when the holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.”

suggested talking points

1. Jesus demonstrated His Love and message after the passion. Lest the disciples would think they could carry out His commission in their own power, whom did He send and why?
2. Jesus acknowledged John’s role in water baptism but told of another baptism. To what was He referring?
